2010 Legislative Report

Introduction

This Legislative Report includes:

Descriptions of key votes: Numbered explanations of votes taken in the Senate and the House that include the action voted on (motion, amendment, passage, etc.), together with the Minnesota AFL-CIO's position, the vote outcome and vote totals.

Tables showing key 2010 votes: Grids showing whether legislators supported or opposed working families with their votes. The numbered columns in the tables correspond to the numbered votes for the appropriate legislative body. These grids also contain vote issue, date, and House/Senate Journal pages.

Definitions of right and wrong votes: A legislator's vote is recorded as "Right" (R) - supporting the Minnesota AFL-CIO position, or "Wrong" (W) - opposing the Minnesota AFL-CIO position. If the legislator was absent or did not vote, "Not Voting" (NV) is recorded.

Lifetime voting records: The Minnesota AFL-CIO Lifetime Voting Records of current members of the House and Senate are included on the House and Senate grids in the far right column. Only actual "R" or "W" votes are counted in calculating a legislator's percentage of "right" votes. "NV"s are not used in calculating the percentage.

Notes on how votes are selected to this report: Votes have been selected for their accuracy as a gauge of legislator's views. For this reason, unanimous or wide margin votes are avoided, unless there are no other significant votes available on an important issue. The legislature often makes critical decisions about the content of legislation through votes on amendments or procedural motions. These votes frequently reveal a legislator's true position on an important issue more clearly than lopsided votes on a bill's final passage.

Sources: Information sources used to compile this record include the journals of the Minnesota House and Senate, the text of bills, the publications Session Weekly and Session Briefly, and affiliate websites.

Legislative Priorities: Jobs & Revenue

Jobs

Construction Jobs

- Pass a bonding bill of at least \$1 billion early in the session to get Minnesotans back to work quickly.
- Pass the Construction Jobs Coalition bill.
- Put people back to work by leveraging and stimulating private investment in the construction of commercial, industrial, energy-efficient retrofit, and residential projects across the state.

Green Jobs

- Enact legislation and/or policies to encourage private -sector “green” manufacturing.
- Retrofit public buildings to meet energy and environmental standards.

Job Creation Strategies

- Create a \$12 per hour wage subsidy program to help small and medium-sized public, private and non-profit employers cover the cost of hiring new workers or rehiring laid-off workers. A state program – funded with a small portion of a progressive revenue-raising package – is more efficient than any other stimulus program because it has a lower cost per job created, addresses short-term job needs, and provides benefits over the next several years.
- Pass policies to encourage high-wage job creation in Minnesota and the United States.
- Enact legislation to remove tax credits for companies that “off-shore” their workers’ jobs and give those incentives to companies that create jobs here.
- Pass legislation to prohibit state agencies from contracting with companies that outsource work and job opportunities to other countries.
- Fund a strong public E-12 and higher education system to prepare the high-quality workers that Minnesota needs today and tomorrow.
- Public school funding must be equitable, sustainable, predictable, and sufficient to provide a strong foundation for the next generation of workers and business owners.



Worker Protection

- Extend unemployment benefits and COBRA health coverage.
- Affirm workers’ rights to join unions by prohibiting public employers from using state funds to influence organizing efforts.
- Require all employers to remain neutral in organizing campaigns (labor peace).
- Support the use of Labor/Management, negotiated Project Labor Agreements on public construction and renovation projects.

Revenue

Balanced Approach

- Raise revenue as a part of the solution to the state's budget deficit.
- Enact a balanced solution which is much less harmful to Minnesota's economy than budget cuts alone. The governor and legislature must eliminate "smoke and mirrors" budgeting that uses gimmicks, shifts and unallotment.
- Stop the cuts and unallotments to E-12 public and higher education, health care, and local government – cuts that devastate communities.
- Stop job loss. Every time a Minnesotan loses his or her job it weakens local communities. Unemployment increases economic stress on social programs, taxpayers and especially working families.

Tax Fairness

- Ensure all Minnesotans pay taxes in proportion to income. Minnesota's middle class families (\$35,000 - \$97,000) pay 12.4 percent of their income in state and local taxes while those in the top income brackets (\$194,000 and over), pay only 9 percent.
- Raise revenue to sustain public schools and other vital public services, such as Meals on Wheels for seniors, public safety, and services for the disabled.

Job Creation

House vote #s 1, 3, 6/Senate vote #s 3, 4, 6:

HF 2700 - Rep. Alice Hausman (DFL-St. Paul)/Sen. Keith Langseth (DFL-Glyndon) – Omnibus Bonding bill. In the beginning, a key difference between house and senate bills was the differing amounts that they gave to the University of Minnesota and the Minnesota State Colleges and Universities System. Other differences included money for transit corridors and flood mitigation. Negotiations throughout the conference committee process brought the bill to \$999.9 million. The bill would have created and estimated 27,000 jobs statewide.

The governor line-item vetoed the final bill down to a measly \$685 million – eliminating thousands of potential jobs.

Senate vote #7/House vote #9:

HF 2695 – Representative Ann Lenczewski (D-Minneapolis)/ Senator Tom Bakk (D-Cook) Also known as Jobs Bill #2, contained many provisions aimed at stimulating the economy through business investment and job creation. Here are some of the provisions contained in the bill:

- An investment credit for “angel” type venture capital investments
- A refundable historic structure rehabilitation credit
- Authority for local governments to finance energy conservation improvements and collect repayments as special assessments (at the request of the property owner)
- Authority of the Public Finance Authority to issue revenue bonds for city transportation projects
- Compact development tax increment financing districts
- Expanded authority to temporarily use TIF for economic development
- Expanded authority to use excess TIF revenues for construction of new private development
- Provision of modified JOBZ benefits to the Ford Motor Company site in St. Paul, if certain conditions are met
- Expanded authority for several cities to use TIF for housing replacement
- Additional flexibility for the city of Bloomington to develop the Mall of America site



Bill was passed by both houses and signed by the governor.

House vote #8:

Proposed by Representative Steve Drazkowski (R-Wabasha) **would have deleted the provision allowing for Property Assessed Clean Energy financing (PACE)**. This optional program is a way to finance solar systems or energy efficiency retrofits, where the city offers you a loan and you pay it back through your property tax bills over 15 to 20 years. This program has shown great success in other states and has created thousands of direct good-paying jobs.

Tax Fairness

House vote #11:

A proposed amendment by Representative Frank Hornstein (D-Minneapolis) would further close what are commonly known as corporate tax avoidance schemes or tax ‘loopholes’.

A little understood provision of Minnesota tax law is allowing some Minnesota corporations to reduce their corporate income tax liability by 80% through what is called the “foreign royalty subtraction”.

Multi-national corporations are also shifting their profits to low-tax foreign “tax haven” countries without actually locating a substantial portion of their business in these countries in order to take advantage of low tax rates and to avoid federal and state taxes in the U.S.



By some reports, U.S. corporate profits reported in tax haven nations can exceed the entire gross domestic product of these nations by 300 percent or more. These tax avoidance schemes allow big companies and wealthy individuals to benefit from our onshore benefits of tax – like the infrastructure, education, health care, and public safety we fight so hard to preserve – while using the offshore world to escape their responsibilities to pay for it.

According to estimates from the Minnesota Department of Revenue, putting an end to these tax avoidance schemes would generate approximately \$400 million over the next three years, and would have been used to directly offset the cuts to specific areas within health and human services.

Amendment prevailed, but the entire Omnibus Health and Human Services bill (HF 2614) was vetoed by the governor.

Senate vote #9/House vote #13:

HF 2037 – Senator Richard Cohen (D-St. Paul)/Representative Loren Solberg (D-Grand Rapids) This bill is also known as the ‘Budget Balancing bill.’ Despite all its reductions in appropriations for fiscal years 2010 and 2011, it increased revenues by approximately \$435.4 million in fiscal year 2011, to address the \$2.9 billion budget short fall. It added a new 9.1 percent rate at \$200,000 of taxable income for married joint filers, with the threshold adjusted for other filing statuses (\$100,000 for married separate filers, \$113,110 for single filers, and \$170,350 for head of household filers). The 9.1 percent rate would sunset after tax year 2013 if the February 2013 forecast showed a general fund balance of \$500 million or more.

The bill narrowly passed both houses but was vetoed by the governor.

A Balanced Approach

House vote #2/Senate vote #2:

SF 2168 – Sen. Linda Berglin (D-Minneapolis)/Rep. Erin Murphy (D-St. Paul) This bill established a temporary General Assistance Medical Care (GAMC) program for the period March 1, 2010, through June 30, 2011.

The bill specified eligibility criteria, covered services and payment rates, allowed counties to provide services through a coordinated care delivery option, and made changes in the delivery of certain mental health services. The bill provided funding sources for GAMC and suspended certain provisions of current GAMC law.

The governor vetoed this bill even though it had overwhelming bi-partisan support.

House vote #4/Senate vote #5:

SF 2168 – Sen. Linda Berglin (D-Minneapolis)/Rep. Erin Murphy (D-St. Paul) Veto override attempt. As expected, not a single Republican supported the attempt in the House, playing party politics rather than helping the most vulnerable Minnesotans. At the very end, House Majority Leader Tony Sertich (D-Chisholm) switched his vote, merely for procedural reasons, allowing for another override at a later date.

Override attempt failed.

Senate vote #11/House vote #16:

HF 2614 – Senator Linda Berglin (D-Minneapolis)/Representative Tom Huntley (D-Duluth) The Omnibus Health and Human Services bill would have reduced General Fund health and human services spending by \$114 million in the current biennium through a combination of cuts, transfers and new revenue. It contained proposals to:

- broaden eligibility for the state's Medicaid program

- extend the expiration date for the state premium subsidy program for COBRA continuation coverage from December 31, 2010, to August 31, 2011, and extend the exemption from the four-month uninsured requirement to February 28, 2012, to reflect the extension of the federal premium subsidy program for continuation coverage.
- increase the provider surcharge on hospitals and HMOs, to the tune of \$160 million per year. This money would have leveraged an additional \$130 million in federal matching dollars
- reserved funding for some State Operated Services facilities slated for closure

The governor vetoed the bill. Much of the health and human services budget bill was later included in Special Session (SS) HF1/SS SF 1.

Worker Protection

Senate vote #10/House vote #14:

SF 2510 – Senator David Tomassoni (D-Chisholm)/Representative Mike Obermueller (D-Eagan) The Omnibus Employment and Economic Development policy bill contained several Unemployment Insurance provisions including:

- Provides continuation of Minnesota’s 13-week extended unemployment benefits and creates a new program for those falling through the cracks of federal coverage.
- Staffing service. Defines a staffing service as an employer whose business involves employing individuals directly for the purpose of furnishing temporary assignment workers to clients of the staffing service.
- Suitable employment. Specifying that suitable employment does not include employment with a staffing service if less than 45 percent of the applicant’s wage credits are from a job assignment with the client of a staffing service.
- Employment misconduct defined. Modifies that standard for employment misconduct by establishing that a violation of standards of behavior must be egregious rather than serious.
- Telephone number. Requires that for any unemployment benefit determination, a telephone number must be prominently displayed for applicants or employers to contact with questions or to request further information.
- Unemployment law judges. Provides for minimum salary standards for unemployment law judges.
- Administrative penalties. Directs the commissioner to penalize employers who make offers of employment to an applicant when in fact, there are no jobs available.

The governor line-item vetoed two provisions from the bill and signed it into law.

Senate vote #1/House vote #7:

Proposed by Senator David Hann (R-Eden Prairie) and by Representative Steve Gottwalt, would have **suspended prevailing wage on bonding projects**. Minnesota’s prevailing law dates back to 1973. The last major evaluation of its effectiveness was conducted in 1998 by the Department of Labor and Industry. A study, during the administration of Republican governor Arne Carlson, concluded: “...Not only is the prevailing wage legislation doing what it was intended to do, but absent such a provision, the effects are harmful to the industry and local economy.” Prevailing wage laws are based on the principle that taxpayer money should not be used to undercut the standard of living in a local community.

Senate vote #8/House vote #12:

Proposed by Senator David Hann (R-Eden Prairie) and by Representative Mark Buesgens (R-Jordan), respectively,



this amendment would have **moved all state employees from their defined benefit plans to defined contribution plans** after July 1, 2010. Defined benefits guarantee your retirement income no matter what happens in the stock market, how long you live, or whether you become disabled. Under a contribution plan, workers lose the ability to plan ahead for a comfortable retirement because savings are subject to investment risk and benefits depend on an employee's ability to save. Here are some facts about public pensions in Minnesota:

- Public pensions are modest.
- Minnesota's pension systems pay out more than \$2.5 billion, add \$3.3 billion to the state economy, and create 22,500 additional jobs.
- State and local taxes collected on our pensions exceed public employer pension contributions by \$80 million a year.
- 90% of retired public workers stay in Minnesota. That benefits our economy and keeps seniors self-sufficient.
- More than 20% of senior citizens are living in poverty with only Social Security
- Minnesota taxpayers pay for only 15 cents of every dollar in public pension benefits.
- Most private pensions are 100% employer paid. Public employees pay for half of theirs.
- Defined benefit focuses on how much is paid to the retired worker. Defined contribution focuses on how much goes into the plan.
- Defined benefit plans cost half of what defined contribution plans cost to deliver the same benefit due to superior investment management and pooling of longevity risk.

Both House and Senate amendment attempts failed.

Proposed by Representative Steve Gottwalt (R-St. Cloud) This amendment, presented as a way to 'help lower the cost of state and local government', was just an attempt to **diminish collective bargaining rights** for public sector employees.

Proposed by Representative Randy Demmer (R-Hayfield). His proposed amendment, **reducing licensing standards for teachers**, would allow individuals to begin teaching with insufficient training – as little as 200 hours in some cases – and with limited classroom experience. Despite labor’s efforts to express strong opposition to this language, it continued to move forward. Seeing that compromise needed to happen, Education Minnesota agreed on language that would (1) allow mid-career professionals to acquire a two-year limited-term license and to prepare for a standard entrance license, if a need for teachers exists in a shortage subject area identified by the department and: (2) would require a candidate to have a bachelor’s degree and at least ten years of professional experience in the licensure area being sought or hold a valid teaching license and have at least five years of classroom teaching experience. Representative Will Morgan (D-Burnsville) amended this language into the bill. However, the original language that weakened licensure requirements for our teachers wasn’t removed. In the end, no education bill was passed.

Proposed by Representative Keith Downey (R-Edina). Language was inserted into the State Government Omnibus Policy bill requiring the state’s chief information officer, in consultation with the commissioner of management and budget, “to study the feasibility and estimated costs of entering into a lease or lease-purchase agreement with a private nonprofit organization, involving a private sector developer, to provide a centralized data center for state agencies, using state employees, or to upgrade current facilities for purposes of data center consolidation, using state employees.” The study will include a report of a potential schedule for consolidation of existing state agency data centers, and an estimate of any savings, increased efficiencies, or performance improvements that would be achieved through this consolidation. **The original language to conduct the study was amended to require it is staffed with state employees. This amendment would have eliminated that requirement.**

Fair Elections

House vote #5:

Proposed by Representative Tom Emmer (R-Delano) would have required voters to show photo identification before receiving a ballot in a polling place. Requiring voters to show a photo ID before voting on Election Day could block thousands of eligible Minnesota voters and substantially increase wait times at polling locations. Although most Minnesotans have a government-issued photo ID, studies show that many eligible voters statewide do not; the percentage is highest for seniors, people of color, people with disabilities, low-income voters, and students. Allegations of voter fraud generate big headlines, especially around election time. In fact, nearly all claims of voter fraud prove to be unfounded.
