

# 2013 LEGISLATIVE REPORT



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#### INTRODUCTION

AFTER A DECADE OF CUTS-ONLY BUDGETS & FISCAL GIMMICKS THAT MADE LIFE HARDER FOR MIDDLE CLASS MINNESOTANS, OUR ELECTED LEADERS HAD AN OPPORTUNITY TO FINALLY PUT MINNESOTA BACK ON TRACK.

FROM BALANCING THE STATE'S BUDGET BY MAKING TAXES FAIRER, TO EXPANDING THE RIGHTS OF WORKING PEOPLE TO CHOOSE TO FORM A UNION, THE 2013 SESSION PROVED TO BE A HISTORIC STEP FORWARD.



WHILE THERE IS STILL MUCH TO DO IN ORDER TO BUILD A BETTER MINNESOTA FOR WORKING FAMILIES, WE ARE FINALLY MOVING IN THE RIGHT DIRECTION.

**DEFINITION OF RIGHT AND WRONG VOTES:** A LEGISLATOR'S VOTE IS RECORDED AS "RIGHT" (R), SUPPORTING THE MINNESOTA AFL-CIO POSITION, OR "WRONG" (W), OPPOSING THE MINNESOTA AFL-CIO POSITION. If THE LEGISLATOR WAS ABSENT OR DID NOT VOTE, "NOT VOTING" (NV) IS RECORDED.

**LIFETIME VOTING RECORDS:** THE MINNESOTA AFL-CIO LIFETIME VOTING RECORDS OF CURRENT MEMBERS OF THE HOUSE AND SENATE ARE INCLUDED ON THE HOUSE AND SENATE GRIDS IN THE FAR RIGHT COLUMN. ONLY ACTUAL "R" OR "W" ARE COUNTED IN CALCULATING THE PERCENTAGE.

NOTES ON HOW VOTES ARE SELECTED: VOTES HAVE BEEN SELECTED FOR THEIR ACCURACY AS A GAUGE OF LEGISLATORS' VIEWS. FOR THIS REASON, UNANIMOUS OR WIDE-MARGIN VOTES ARE AVOIDED, UNLESS THERE ARE NO OTHER SIGNIFICANT VOTES AVAILABLE ON AN IMPORTANT ISSUE. THESE VOTES FREQUENTLY REVEAL A LEGISLATOR'S TRUE POSITION ON AN ISSUE MORE CLEARLY THAN LOPSIDED VOTES ON A BILL'S PASSAGE.

#### MINNESOTA AFL-CIO 2013 LEGISLATIVE PRIORITIES

#### INCREASING REVENUE

THE 2013 LEGISLATIVE SESSION YIELDED MANY SIGNIFICANT ACCOMPLISHMENTS FOR LABOR. AFTER A DECADE OF BUDGET CUTS AND DEFICITS, THE LEGISLATURE MANAGED TO DELIVER A FAIR AND STRUCTURALLY BALANCED BUDGET, PROVIDING CRITICAL FUNDING FOR EDUCATION, JOB CREATION AND PROPERTY TAX RELIEF - FINALLY PUTTING THE STATE'S FISCAL HOUSE IN ORDER.

THE FINAL BUDGET INCREASES THE INCOME TAX ON HIGH-INCOME MINNESOTANS, CLOSES CORPORATE TAX LOOPHOLES AND RAISES TOBACCO TAXES, WHILE REDUCING PROPERTY TAXES THROUGH INCREASED PROPERTY TAX REFUNDS AND MORE FUNDING FOR LOCAL GOVERNMENT AID. THE BUDGET PACKAGE NOT ONLY RESOLVED THE \$627 MILLION BUDGET SHORTFALL FOR THIS YEAR, BUT ALSO BALANCED THE BUDGET THROUGH FY 2016-17, AND ALLOWS MINNESOTA TO MAKE OVERDUE INVESTMENTS IN OUR SCHOOLS, HEALTH CARE, COLLEGE EDUCATION, JOB CREATION AND OTHER PUBLIC SERVICES THAT ARE CRITICAL TO THE FUTURE SUCCESS OF OUR STATE. HERE ARE SOME OF THE KEY INVESTMENTS:

- RAISES \$1.7 BILLION;
- EDUCATION: \$735 MILLION FROM PRESCHOOL TO POST-SECONDARY, INCLUDING FREE ALL-DAY KINDERGARTEN STATEWIDE AND ADDITIONAL EQUALIZATION REVENUE FOR DISTRICTS:
- JOB CREATION: \$86.5 MILLION THROUGH INITIATIVES SUCH AS THE MINNESOTA INVESTMENT FUND (\$30M) AND \$24 MILLION FOR THE JOB CREATION FUND;
- PROPERTY TAX RELIEF: \$441 MILLION TO REMEDY FAILED POLICIES OF THE PAST THAT HAVE CAUSED MN PROPERTY TAXES TO MORE THAN DOUBLE OVER THE PAST DECADE; INCLUDING:
- O RESTORING AID TO CITIES, COUNTIES AND TOWNSHIPS WITH A NEW AID FORMULA THAT TARGETS AID TO CITIES WITH THE GREATEST NEED; AND
- O THE NEW HOMESTEAD CREDIT THAT DOES A BETTER JOB OF DIRECTING TAX RELIEF TO LOW AND MODERATE INCOME FAMILIES.

#### CREATING JOBS

- THE FIRST BONDING BILL OF \$800 MILLION FAILED TO PASS THE HOUSE, FALLING FIVE VOTES SHORT OF THE 81 NEEDED TO PASS. A SECOND MUCH SMALLER BONDING BILL (\$176 MILLION) WAS PUT TOGETHER AT THE END OF SESSION THAT INCLUDED \$109 MILLION FOR THE CAPITOL RENOVATION, A FEW OTHER PROJECTS INCLUDING FLOOD MITIGATION EFFORTS AND MONEY FOR THE EXPANSION OF THE MN VETERANS HOME IN MINNEAPOLIS.
- ROCHESTER DESTINATION MEDICAL CENTER: \$585 MILLION IS ALLOCATED FROM THE STATE TO BUILD PUBLIC INFRASTRUCTURE TO SUPPORT THE EXPANSION OF MAYO CLINIC OVER THE NEXT 20 YEARS. IT REQUIRES AT LEAST \$250 MILLION IN PRIVATE INVESTMENT TO LEVERAGE THE STATE CONTRIBUTION. THE CITY MUST ALSO CONTRIBUTE \$128 MILLION AND THE STATE ALSO PROVIDES A \$14 MILLION SALES TAX EXEMPTION ON CONSTRUCTION MATERIALS. IN TOTAL, THE PROJECT IS EXPECTED TO CREATE AT LEAST 35,000-40,000 JOBS OVER THE LIFE OF THE PROJECT.
- PROVISIONS IN THE TAX BILL ALLOW FOR THE MALL OF AMERICA EXPANSION.
- MADE IN MINNESOTA SOLAR ENERGY PRODUCTION INCENTIVE ACCOUNT: ESTABLISHES AN ACCOUNT IN THE SPECIAL REVENUE FUND TO PAY A PER-KWH GENERATED INCENTIVE FOR SOLAR MODULES THAT HAVE BEEN CERTIFIED BY THE COMMISSIONER OF COMMERCE AS "MADE IN MINNESOTA".
- COST OF LIVING STUDY AND REPORT, REQUIRES DEED TO CONDUCT A YEARLY COST OF LIVING STUDY, ADJUSTED FOR FAMILY SIZE, BY COUNTY. THE STUDY MUST ALSO INCLUDE AN ANALYSIS OF STATEWIDE AND COUNTY EMPLOYMENT AND JOB VACANCY DATA AND RECOMMENDATIONS TO ASSIST IN THE ASSESSMENT OF EMPLOYMENT AND ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT PLANNING IN THE STATE. (JOBS NOW)

#### RESTORING WORKPLACE DIGNITY AND FAIRNESS

- . CHILD CARE AND PERSONAL CARE ASSISTANTS HAVE BEEN GIVEN THE RIGHT TO VOTE TO FORM A UNION. PREVIOUSLY THESE PROVIDERS WERE NOT ABLE TO UNIONIZE BECAUSE THEY ARE NOT INCLUDED IN THE DEFINITION OF PUBLIC EMPLOYEE UNDER PELRA AND NEEDED SPECIAL AUTHORITY TO BE RECOGNIZED BY THE STATE AND ASK PROVIDERS IF THEY WANT TO FORM A UNION.
- LOCKED-OUT WORKERS ARE NOW ABLE GET AN ADDITIONAL 26 WEEKS OF UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE FOR UP TO ONE YEAR AFTER THEY HAVE EXHAUSTED ALL OTHER STATE OR FEDERAL BENEFITS IF THE LOCK OUT IS STILL IN PROGRESS.
- EMPLOYEES WHO EXPERIENCE A TRAGIC EVENT AT WORK THAT RESULTS IN POST-TRAUMATIC STRESS DISORDER ARE NOW ABLE TO APPLY FOR WORKERS' COMP. INCREASES IN THE MAXIMUM WEEKLY COMPENSATION RATE FOR INJURIES CAUSING FROM \$850/WEEK TO 102% OF THE STATEWIDE AVERAGE WEEKLY WAGE. AND IMPROVES THE ANNUAL COLA ADJUSTMENT FOR THE MOST SERIOUSLY INJURED WORKERS.
- HOSPITAL STAFFING AND DISCLOSURE REQUIRES HOSPITALS TO DEVELOP STAFFING PLANS AND PUBLISH THEM ONLINE, CONSULT WITH STAFF IN THE PLAN'S DEVELOPMENT, AND THE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH TO CONDUCT A STUDY THAT LOOKS AT THE CORRELATION BETWEEN NURSING STAFF LEVELS, PATIENT SAFETY AND OUTCOMES.
- CLIMB, ONCE CALLED GATE, ALLOWS DISLOCATED WORKERS TO COLLECT UNEMPLOYMENT WHILE IN SELF-EMPLOYMENT ASSISTANCE TRAINING PROVIDED BY THE DISLOCATED WORKER PROGRAM. THIS WAS AN INITIATIVE BROUGHT FORWARD BY THE UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE ADVISORY COUNCIL.
- FOR THE FIRST TIME IN 4 YEARS, NURSING HOME WORKERS AND PUBLIC EMPLOYEES WILL SEE A WAGE INCREASE.
- BAN THE BOX: EFFECTIVE JANUARY 1, 2014, MINNESOTA LAW WILL RESTRICT THE TIMING OF PRE-EMPLOYMENT INQUIRIES BY MOST PRIVATE EMPLOYERS INTO A CANDIDATE'S CRIMINAL PAST. EMPLOYERS WHO ARE NOT EXEMPTED FROM THE LAW MAY NOT (1) INQUIRE INTO OR CONSIDER OR REQUIRE DISCLOSURE OF CRIMINAL RECORD INFORMATION UNTIL THE APPLICANT HAS BEEN SELECTED FOR AN INTERVIEW OR, IF THERE IS NOT AN INTERVIEW, UNTIL A CONDITIONAL JOB OFFER OF EMPLOYMENT HAS BEEN EXTENDED TO THE APPLICANT, AND (2) USE ANY FORM OF EMPLOYMENT APPLICATION THAT SEEKS SUCH CRIMINAL RECORD INFORMATION.
- PERSONAL SICK LEAVE EXPANSION: AMENDS THE USE OF SICK LEAVE BENEFITS TO INCLUDE CARE OF A MINOR OR ADULT CHILD, SPOUSE, SIBLING, PARENT, GRANDPARENT OR STEPPARENT.

#### OTHER SIGNIFICANT LEGISLATION THAT PASSED

- THE FIRST PRIORITY FOR THE LEGISLATURE THIS SESSION WAS TO CREATE MINNESOTA'S **HEALTH CARE EXCHANGE**. THE FEDERAL ACA DIRECTED STATES TO CREATE THEIR OWN EXCHANGES, OR A FEDERAL EXCHANGE WOULD BE CREATED FOR THEM. MINNESOTA'S NEW EXCHANGE IS CALLED MNSURE, AND ITS GOAL IS TO PROVIDE CONSUMERS AND BUSINESSES WITH A COMPARISON OF AVAILABLE HEALTH PLANS.
- FEDERAL AFFORDABLE CARE ACT CONFORMITY ALIGNS MINNESOTA LAW WITH THE FEDERAL ACA AND PRESERVES THE STATE'S AUTHORITY TO OVERSEE IT HEALTH COVERAGE MARKET. THE LEGISLATION MAKES CHANGES TO MARKET RULES TO PROTECT CONSUMERS WHILE PROMOTING HEALTH, MINIMIZING CARRIER RISK BY ADDRESSING ADVERSE SELECTION AND ENCOURAGING INSURERS TO COMPETE ON QUALITY AND VALUE INSTEAD OF RISK SELECTION AND UNDERWRITING.
- MEDICAL ASSISTANCE EXPANSION: THE FIRST BILL SIGNED INTO LAW THIS SESSION. PROVIDES EXPANDED HEALTH CARE COVERAGE FOR 35,000 MINNESOTANS.
- THE K-12 EDUCATION BILL INCREASED FUNDING BY \$485 MILLION FOR FY 2014-15, WITH THE LARGEST INVESTMENT BEING FREE ALL-DAY KINDERGARTEN STATEWIDE. IT ALSO INCREASED THE BASIC FUNDING FORMULA BY 1.5 PERCENT EACH YEAR, TARGETED

INVESTMENTS TO ADDRESS THE OPPORTUNITY AND ACHIEVEMENT GAP, ADDITIONAL CAREER AND TECHNICAL PROGRAMS, ADDITIONAL SAFE SCHOOL AID, AND EXPANDED ADULT LEARNING OPPORTUNITIES.

- THE HIGHER EDUCATION BILL INVESTED \$250 MILLION IN ADDITIONAL REVENUE TO CONTINUE TO MAKE HIGHER EDUCATION MORE AFFORDABLE, INCREASED FUNDING FOR FINANCIAL AID TO LOW AND MIDDLE INCOME STUDENTS BY \$47 MILLION, INCREASED THE CAP ON LIVING EXPENSES AND ADJUSTED THE SHARE OF TUITION STUDENTS AND FAMILIES ARE REQUIRED TO PAY. MNSCU AND U OF M RECEIVED \$78 MILLION AND \$43 MILLION, RESPECTIVELY, TO FREEZE TUITION FOR TWO YEARS. THE BILL ALSO INCLUDED THE DREAM ACT, WHICH ALLOWS UNDOCUMENTED MINNESOTA STUDENTS TO PAY IN-STATE TUITION AND RECEIVE FINANCIAL AID AT COLLEGES AND UNIVERSITIES IN THE STATE. TO BE ELIGIBLE FOR TUITION AND AID, STUDENTS WOULD HAVE TO GRADUATE FROM A MINNESOTA HIGH SCHOOL AFTER ATTENDING FOR AT LEAST THREE YEARS AND SIGN AN AFFIDAVIT AGREEING TO APPLY FOR CITIZENSHIP AS SOON AS HE OR SHE IS ELIGIBLE.
- A TRADE POLICY ADVISORY COUNCIL WILL BE ESTABLISHED TO ADVISE AND ASSIST THE GOVERNOR AND THE LEGISLATURE REGARDING US TRADE AGREEMENTS. THE 15-MEMBER COUNCIL WILL CONSIST OF REPRESENTATIVES FROM LABOR, ENVIRONMENTAL INTERESTS, FAMILY FARMERS, BUSINESS AND INDUSTRY, AND INTERNATIONAL TRADE AND DEVELOPMENT, MEMBERS OF THE HOUSE AND SENATE. COUNCIL MEMBERS SERVE TWO-YEAR TERMS.
- VOTING RIGHTS: THE MAJOR ACCOMPLISHMENT WAS ENACTING NO-EXCUSE ABSENTEE BALLOTING.

THE OMNIBUS ELECTIONS BILL FELL SHORT OF MANY REFORMS DUE A REQUIREMENT FROM THE GOVERNOR THAT THE BILL HAVE BIPARTISAN SUPPORT.

WHILE SEVERAL KEY PIECES OF LEGISLATION PASSED IN 2013, MUCH WORK IS YET TO BE DONE:
