The DFL Party go on record supporting the Wage Theft Prevention Act to establish a statutory definition of wage theft making it a specific violation of law and provide more authority for the Minnesota Department of Labor and Industry to get wage records and authority for increased penalties for employers who fail to keep employment records, and for employers who willfully or repeatedly violate wage and hour laws.

- Wage theft occurs when employers do not pay employees what is owed to them for work performed.
- The Department of Labor and Industry (DLI) estimates that over 39,000 workers suffer from wage theft in Minnesota each year. This has an impact of \$11.9 million dollars of wages that are owed, but not paid to Minnesota workers.
- The Minnesota Wage Theft Prevention Act provides funding for four staff to perform outreach, education and strategic enforcement in the Twin Cities and greater Minnesota.
