- Corporate or local interference, a.k.a. "Preemption", is designed to strip local governments of the authority to enact ordinances related to the minimum wage or any other benefit, term of employment, working condition, or attendance or leave policy that exceeds state or federal law.
- The push to enact Corporate Interference laws in Minnesota is part of an alarming effort around the country in which powerful corporate interests, such as the Koch Brothers, are interfering with the democratic process in order to stop people in local communities from improving basic, minimum workplace standards.
- This attack on local autonomy would have far-reaching and lasting impacts on families, communities, workers, and their local representatives, including:
 - o Working families in cities across the state would see basic workplace standards suppressed,
 - o Local residents' opportunities for political participation would be severely weakened.
